Christmas 1941 was a very different Christmas for many Americans. We were thrust into World War II. President Roosevelt wasted no time in asking Congress for a declaration of war on Japan and then Germany. America had been preparing for the war that was now on our doorstep. Now it was time for full-on war production and recruitment of soldiers. With Christmas around the corner, President Roosevelt kept the Spirit of Christmas alive when he insisted on the Lighting of the National Christmas Tree at the White House. He believed that even during a time of war, Christmas was a time to pause and reflect on the best aspects of humanity. I believe that our American Legion Family is that reflection of the best parts of humanity. We live by our motto "Service above Self". In 1941 the American Legion Family was there to help with military recruitment and war bond sales. Legion Posts were used for military and defense needs. In 1941 the Auxiliary worked extensively with the Red Cross. That year they donated six mobile blood units and created the Emergency Committee to support the war efforts. In 1942 there was a shortage of nurses. The ALA provided nursing scholarships and sponsored 1,000 students. In 1944 the ALA established the rehabilitation programs for disabled veterans. I challenge each of you to have a servant's heart this Christmas.



- Their HOPE & DREAMS that didn't always come true but left them with no regrets.


Parts of the Wreath Symbols

Food insecurity among U.S. veterans and military families is a national security concern: it multiplies stress on active-duty personnel, diminishes well-being among service members and their children—who are more likely to serve in the military as adults—and may hinder recruitment for the armed services.
